Sardar Patel University houses several teacher education colleges that provide a variety of resources ranging from traditional print materials to modern electronic databases. However, the quality, accessibility, and utilization of these resources vary significantly. This study aims to evaluate the present status of information resource services in these libraries and provide suggestions for improvement.

II. OBJECTIVES OF THE STUDY

1. To examine the information resources available in the education college libraries of Sardar Patel University.
2. To analyze the services provided to users, including both traditional and electronic services.
3. To evaluate infrastructural facilities and staffing conditions.
