This movement emerged as a response to the socio-religious challenges faced by the Bodos, aiming to foster cultural preservation, social reform, and a distinct community identity. Rooted in the principles of monotheism, ethical living, and self-reliance, Brahma Dharma sought to rejuvenate indigenous traditions while integrating modern values. This study explores how Gurudev Kalicharan Brahma's vision was not only redefined the spiritual landscape of the Bodo people but also catalyzed a broader cultural renaissance. His teachings emphasized education, gender equality, spirituality, non-violence and the rejection of superstitions, which significantly contributed to social upliftment. Brahma Dharma stood as a beacon of hope for the Bodo people in their time of crisis. The principles of this faith emphasized the belief in monotheism, the rejection of idolatry and a commitment to ethical living. The philosophy of Brahma Dharma believes in the seven elements air, water, fire, space, moon and sun as integral to life's balance and the universe's harmony. Principles of Brahma Dharma also stood firm against superstitious beliefs emphasizing rationality and rebirth, while upholding non-violence as a key ethical principle. Its teachings advocated Yagya Ahuti, yoga and meditation as right way of prayer to God. Through these reforms, he ensured the preservation of Bodo identity as indigenous people and their rich traditional culture, offering his community not only a spiritual path but a sense of resilience in the face of adversity.

This paper will explore the profound impact of Brahma Dharma propagated by Kalicharan Brahma in the year 1906 on the Bodo community tracing how its principles helped restore identity, dignity, unity and cultural pride among the Bodo people, while also highlighting the enduring legacy of Kalicharan Brahma as a revered spiritual leader and great social reformer.
