Despite these difficulties, Andhra Pradesh embarked on a new journey of reconstruction and growth through innovative governance, economic reforms, and social welfare initiatives. The concept of the "Sunrise State" emerged from the vision of transforming Andhra Pradesh into a globally competitive and economically vibrant state. The government introduced strategic development plans such as Vision 2029, focusing on sustainable economic growth, industrialisation, infrastructure development, digital governance, human resource development, and social inclusion. These initiatives aimed to position Andhra Pradesh among the leading states of India in terms of economic performance and quality of life. Politically, Andhra Pradesh has witnessed significant changes in governance structures, administrative reforms, and decentralisation efforts. IV. REVIEW OF LITERATURE

Rao and Nagayya (2017) analysed the economic structure of Andhra Pradesh in the post-bifurcation period. The researchers observed that despite financial constraints, Andhra Pradesh maintained steady economic growth through effective planning and resource utilisation.

Jayalakshmi (2017) examined the sectoral performance of the Andhra Pradesh economy after state reorganisation. The researcher emphasised the need for balanced sectoral development to sustain long-term growth.

Sivaram (2017) investigated the financial implications of the Andhra Pradesh Reorganisation Act, 2014. The study revealed that the state faced considerable fiscal challenges due to revenue loss after bifurcation. The author suggested strengthening industrial investment and infrastructure development to improve fiscal stability.

Koti Reddy (2017) studied regional disparities in Andhra Pradesh and found considerable developmental differences between Coastal Andhra and Rayalaseema regions. The study recommended region-specific planning and targeted investments to ensure balanced development across the state.

Government of Andhra Pradesh (2018) The *Sunrise Andhra Pradesh Vision 2029* document presented a comprehensive roadmap for transforming the state into one of India's leading economies. The report focused on economic growth, industrialisation, digital governance, infrastructure development, skill

enhancement, and social inclusion as key pillars of development.

Andhra Pradesh Economic Development Board (2018) reported that the state achieved notable progress in attracting domestic and foreign investments. The report highlighted Andhra Pradesh's high ranking in Ease of Doing Business and emphasised the role of industrial corridors, ports, and logistics infrastructure in economic growth.

Reddy and Rao (2019) examined governance reforms in Andhra Pradesh, particularly the implementation of e-governance and digital administration. The study concluded that technology-based governance improved transparency, accountability, and public service delivery across the state.

National Institution for Transforming India (NITI Aayog) (2020) NITI Aayog's reports on state development indicators showed that Andhra Pradesh made substantial progress in areas such as healthcare, education, digital governance, and sustainable development. The report recognised the state's efforts towards achieving inclusive growth and human development.

Krishna Kumar and Lakshmi (2021) studied the impact of welfare schemes on rural households in Andhra Pradesh. Their findings indicated that social welfare programmes significantly improved access to education, healthcare, housing, and financial assistance among economically weaker sections.

Andhra Pradesh Socio-Economic Survey (2023) The Socio-Economic Survey highlighted recent developments in the state's economy and society. However, it also identified challenges such as unemployment, regional disparities, and climate-related risks.

Subsequently, on 1 November 1956, Andhra State was merged with the Telugu-speaking districts of the former Hyderabad State under the States Reorganisation Act, leading to the formation of Andhra Pradesh with Hyderabad as its capital. For nearly six decades, Andhra Pradesh remained one of the largest states in India. However, regional disparities and demands for separate statehood led to the creation of Telangana on 2 June 2014 through the Andhra Pradesh Reorganisation Act, 2014. Hyderabad became the capital of Telangana, while the residuary Andhra Pradesh faced significant challenges, including the absence of a permanent capital, revenue deficits, and infrastructure shortages. Following bifurcation, Andhra Pradesh entered a new phase of development and reconstruction. The state government introduced the concept of the "**Sunrise State**" to reflect its vision of rapid economic growth, technological advancement, and inclusive social development. The vision aimed to transform Andhra Pradesh into a globally competitive state through strategic planning, investment promotion, industrialisation, and human resource development. A major milestone in this journey was the launch of

Vision 2029, which outlined long-term goals for economic growth, governance reforms, infrastructure development, and social welfare. The vision focused on making Andhra Pradesh one of the top three states in India by 2029 through sustainable and inclusive development. Special emphasis was placed on sectors such as agriculture, manufacturing, information technology, logistics, tourism, education, and healthcare. The state also initiated several administrative and governance reforms, including e-governance programmes, village and ward secretariat systems, digital service delivery, and decentralised administration. Efforts were made to strengthen industrial infrastructure through industrial corridors, special economic zones, ports, airports, and logistics hubs.
