In recent decades, Andhra Pradesh has witnessed substantial progress in women's education, with increasing enrolment rates in schools, colleges, professional courses, and research programmes. 2. 6. Rao (2012) Rao conducted a study on women's education in Andhra Pradesh and reported that educational opportunities for women had expanded considerably after Independence. 7. Rani and Kumar (2018) Rani and Kumar examined women's education and empowerment in Andhra Pradesh and Telangana. The study found that education contributed positively to women's social, economic, and political empowerment. The researchers also identified poverty and traditional social attitudes as barriers to female education.

8. Reddy (2019) Reddy explored the role of education in the empowerment of Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe women in Andhra Pradesh. The findings showed that education improved self-confidence, employment opportunities, and social mobility among women from disadvantaged communities.

9. National Education Policy (2020) The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 emphasised gender inclusion and equitable access to quality education. The policy recommended special measures to increase girls' participation in education and reduce gender disparities at all levels.

10. Kumari (2023) Kumari examined recent trends in women's higher education in Andhra Pradesh and found a significant increase in female enrolment in universities and professional courses. The study highlighted the positive impact of scholarships, residential facilities, and digital learning opportunities on women's educational advancement.

5. **Strengthen Safety Measures:** Provide safe transportation facilities, secure school environments, and effective grievance redressal mechanisms to ensure the safety of female students.
6. **Enhance Digital Access:** Improve access to computers, smartphones, internet connectivity, and digital literacy programmes, especially for rural girls and women.
7. **Promote Higher Education Opportunities:** Increase the number of women's colleges, hostels, and higher educational institutions to encourage female participation in advanced studies.
8. **Encourage STEM Education:** Motivate girls to pursue Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) courses through special scholarships, mentorship programmes, and career guidance.
9. **Strengthen Career Guidance and Counselling:** Provide regular career guidance, academic counselling, and skill development programmes to help female students make informed educational and career choices.

10. Promote Community Participation: Encourage the active involvement of parents, teachers, local leaders, and community organisations in supporting and monitoring girls' educational progress.
