a) Recurrent Neural Network (RNN)

Recurrent Neural Networks are specifically designed to handle sequential and time-dependent data. Unlike traditional neural networks, RNNs have recurrent connections that allow information to persist across time steps. At each step, the model takes the current input along with the previous hidden state to produce an output.

This structure enables RNNs to model temporal dependencies, making them suitable for tasks like stock prediction and speech recognition. However, RNNs suffer from the vanishing and exploding gradient problem, which makes it difficult to learn long-term dependencies during training.

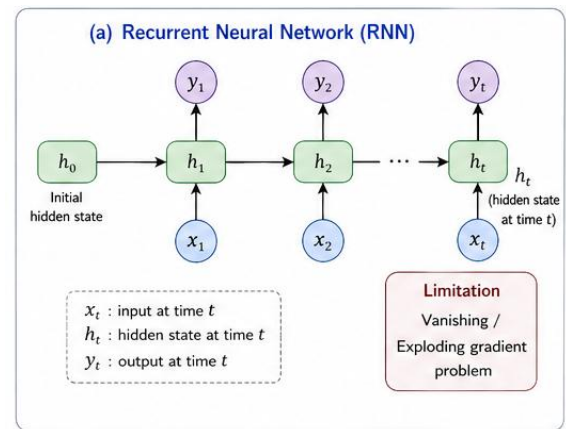


Fig. RNN

b) Long Short-Term Memory (LSTM)

LSTM is an advanced version of RNN designed to overcome its limitations. It introduces a memory cell and three main gates:

- Input Gate – controls what new information is stored
- Forget Gate – decides what information to discard
- Output Gate – determines what information to output

These gates allow LSTM to retain important information over long periods, making it highly effective for long-term forecasting problems such as weather prediction and financial analysis. LSTMs are widely used due to their high accuracy and stability in handling complex time series data.

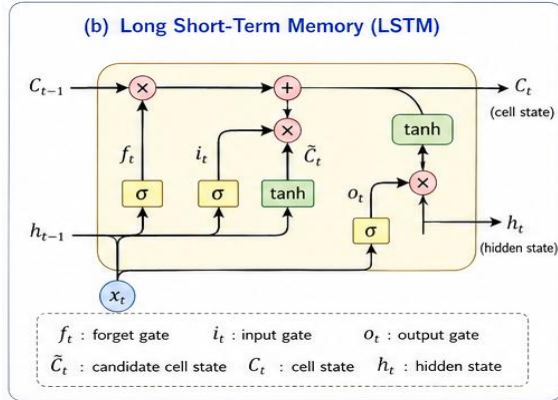


Fig. LSTM

c) Gated Recurrent Unit (GRU)

GRU is a simplified version of LSTM that combines the forget and input gates into a single update gate and uses a reset gate. This reduces the complexity of the model while maintaining similar performance.

GRUs require fewer parameters, making them faster to train and more efficient, especially when working with smaller datasets or limited computational resources. They are often preferred when speed and simplicity are important.

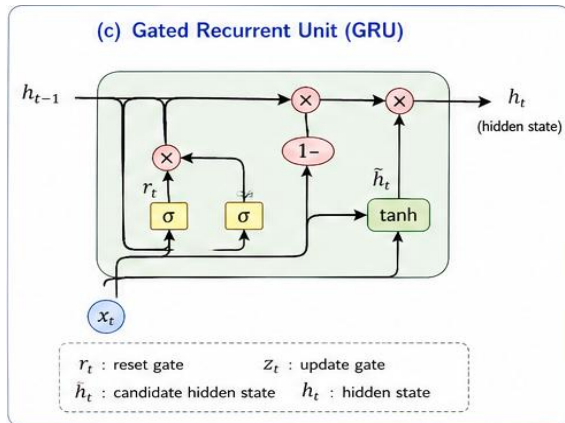

d) Transformer Models

Transformers represent a major advancement in sequence modeling by replacing recurrence with an attention mechanism. Instead of processing data step-by-step, transformers analyze the entire sequence at once and assign importance to different time steps using self-attention.

This allows them to capture global dependencies more effectively than RNN-based models. Variants like Time Series Transformers and Informer are

specifically designed for forecasting tasks. Transformers are highly scalable and perform well on large datasets, but they require significant computational power.

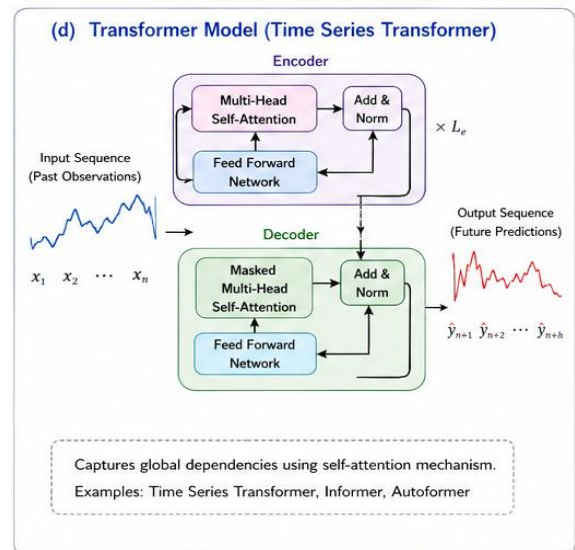


Fig. Transformer Model

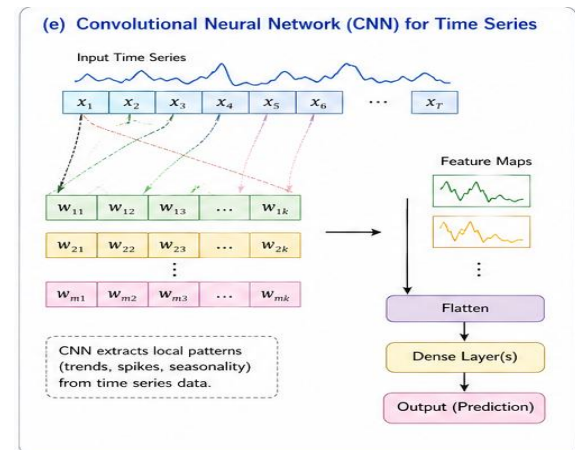

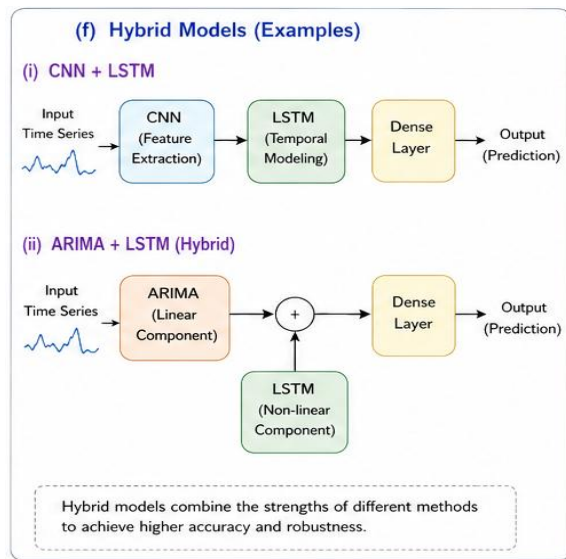


Fig. Hybrid Models

- Used to train deep learning models
- Minimizes error

10. Loss Functions

- Measure prediction accuracy
- Example:

$$\text{MSE} = \frac{1}{n} \sum (y - \hat{y})^2$$

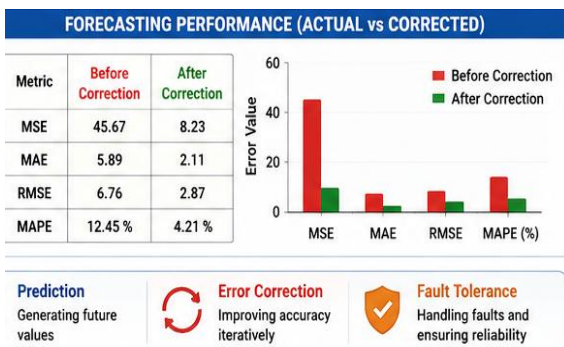
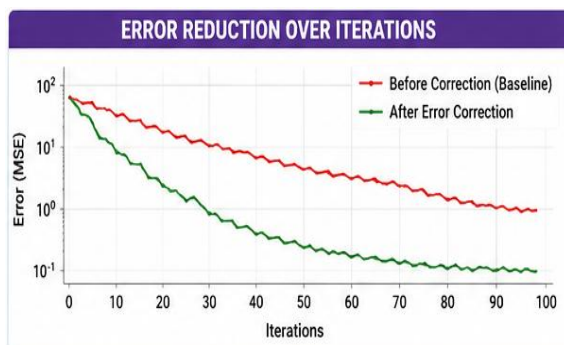
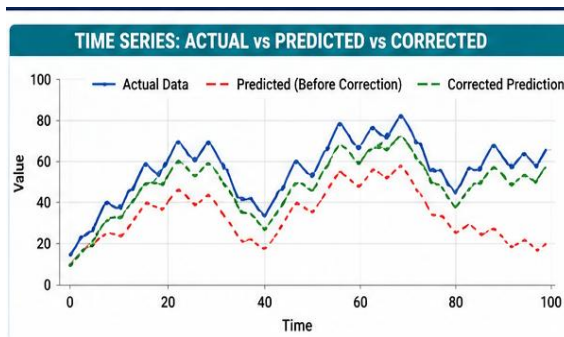
11. Nonlinear Functions

V. TIME SERIES FORECASTING-: ERROR CORRECTION AND FAULT TOLERANCE



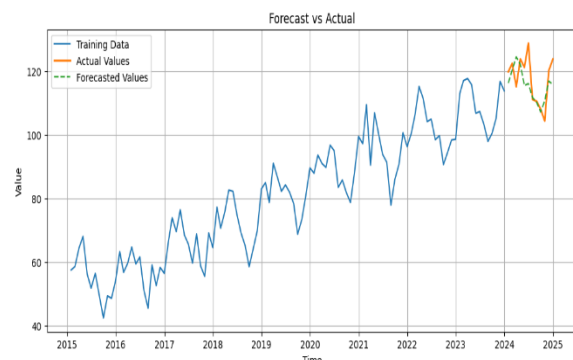
Error Correction Module (Feedback Loop)

 - Residual learning
 - Parameter tuning
 - Retraining
