The characters women in particular are portrayed as emotionally detached individuals fighting to survive in oppressive social frameworks.

Fire Symbolism-One of the most significant representations in the story is a fire. It stands for devastation, violence, hidden fury, and emotional turmoil. The inner conflict buried underneath stillness is reflected in the forest fire at the end of the narrative. The fire also represents resistance to oppression. Raka's preoccupation with the forest fire points to her latent desire for devastation as a reaction to emotional neglect and trauma.
